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Dear Senators and Representatives:

The American Payroll Association (APA)¹ urges you to support provisions in Governor Jared Polis' budget proposal to deposit \$500 million in one-time state funds and \$100 million in federal funds into the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund (UITF). The UITF, which was fully depleted as a result of high unemployment numbers during the COVID-19 pandemic, is set to be replenished through increased unemployment insurance premium surcharges paid by employers with an estimated \$5.3 billion in additional payments between 2023 and 2027, according to the Common Sense Institute.²

For payroll professionals, ensuring that Colorado maintains a healthy UITF without overburdening employers and employees is extremely important. This is especially true because the COVID-19 pandemic caused a heavy depletion in unemployment insurance funds. Using available one-time state funds combined with federal funds from the American Rescue Plan Act is an innovative way for Colorado to reduce the stress on employers in the state as well as their payroll departments.

Again, the APA recommends that the legislature pass budget measures to shore up Colorado's UITF. Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this budget provision and unemployment taxes.
